Kim Tenreiro wrapped up his *Christmas Carol* season bringing in about \$13,000 to area charities. He and **Janet** just returned from Palm Springs, CA where they did lots of hiking!

Wanda Martinez-Johncox is back from Honduras where she helped distribute 3,000 gifts for Christmas, brought medicine to clinics and installed solar power for churches. She is off to Guatemala in March.

Program: Major Dave Rhodes – Salvation Army & the Red Kettle Campaign

Cutting right to the chase – Kiwanis won this year's Kettle War! (Despite the fact they had the worst weather day.) Score was **Rotary**: \$7,800 / **Kiwanis**: \$10,525

Even though the Salvation Army did not make its goal of \$110,000... \$93,000 was raised and almost 20% was by the two service clubs. (Deficit made up from prior years)

Where do the donations go?... Money helps subsidize: Toys and Food for Christmas – 319 families were served this Holiday Season; each received 3 boxes of food. 527 kids received 2,100 toys - all donated by the community. Senior Center – the Center is open 5 days/week, but attendance is a bit sparse now due to Covid.

<u>After-School Programs</u> – Currently 15 kids are being offered snacks and supervision after school (at \$40/week) <u>Day Camp</u> – 40 kids attended this past summer.

<u>Social Services Ministry</u> — working with other area agencies, the Salvation Army helps to fill the gaps with assistance with rent, gas, furniture, meds, bus tickets and food. Need is great — 4 times greater than a couple years ago. \$120,000 for rent assistance over last 2 years alone! <u>Pathway of Hope</u>: Intense case management for 3-4 families to help them to sufficiency. Case worker starts full-time next month.

Despite the hardships - Covid, decreased donations, greater need, difficulty getting volunteers, and program cuts - the Salvation Army is still able to do a little magic in the lives of those who need it most.
