Program:

Spencer Noyes – ECO, DEC was a surprise guest speaker today. Instead of presenting a regular program, he opted for taking questions about his work and the DEC. He was very entertaining, explaining how the number of hunters was way down due to a new generation of kids who haven't grown up in the woods hunting and fishing. He shared a story about a couple fishing in NYC, wrapping the fish up and stowing them under port-a-potties, where some third party picked them and took them to Chinatown restaurants. Ew! He noted that the TV show Northwoods Law was pretty accurate, especially as it relates to robotic deer used to deter Road Hunting. Each deer costs about \$1,000 and if caught, the criminals are responsible for restitution. Common crimes are trespassing, baiting, and taking more fish than allowed or wrong sizes. He explained that we can't sell venison because it's a commercialization of a protected species. Even though coyotes have a season, it's probably ok to kill them anytime. He explained that if there seems to be an area overrun with deer, just keep calling the DEC to get action. How close to a residence can you hunt? Gun – 500 feet, Crossbow – 250 feet, Bow and Arrow – 150 feet. There are ticks everywhere – check yourselves carefully – Lyme is NO FUN! DMAP (Deer Management Assistance Program) is eligible for properties of 50 acres +. They will issue nuisance tags if necessary. Who picks up the dead deer on the road – The DOT, and there's a charge to do it of \$115.00.
